Ecology and Conservation of the Eastern Spotted Skunk: Preface and General Acknowledgments

Fewer than 10 years ago, *Spilogale putorius* (L.) (Eastern Spotted Skunk) was an understudied species. While managers and researchers had reported the small carnivore to be in decline, particularly in the Midwest, knowledge of its distribution and ecology was limited due to the species' secretive nature and the lack of adequate funding opportunities for research and conservation. In many states, the Eastern Spotted Skunk was considered a furbearer (albeit one infrequently harvested), rather than a species of conservation priority.

Today, the Eastern Spotted Skunk is the focus of numerous research and monitoring projects across its range. This special issue reflects the recent shift in research priority driven by the collaborative efforts of university and government scientists. The issue comprises 21 manuscripts covering various topics, including distribution, demography, disease, behavior, and survey methodology. We hope this publication furthers the understanding and conservation of this unique mammal and informs future research activities.

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
